- One in five 16-year-old drivers has an accident the first year of driving.
- 16-year-olds have higher crash rates than drivers of any other age.
- 6 out of 10 teen crashes involve distraction.
- More than half of all teens surveyed say they talk on the phone while driving.
- And then there's texting.

 Each additional passenger in the car increases the driver death rate for 16and 17-year-olds.

More than 40% of teen auto deaths occur between 9 PM and 6 AM.

Despite the risks, teen drivers take to the streets and highways in big numbers every year. Research conducted by the Institute for Highway Safety (IIHS) found that a lot of these teens are driving vehicles that won't protect them in a crash and lack the safety technology in a newer car. The Institute came up with helpful recommendations for parents, including how to choose the safest car possible for a teen driver.

Teen car safety criteria

If you're springing for a new or used car, the Institute recommends using four principles to guide your choice of vehicle for a teen:

- Avoid high horsepower; it tempts a young driver to test the limits.
- Bigger and heavier offers better protection in a crash.
- ESC is a must; this is the feature that helps a driver maintain control on curves
- ad alipport roads

and slippery roads.

Look for vehicles with the best safety ratings possible.

Recommended vehicles based on safety ratings

To help parents make better and safer choices, IIHS compiled a list of recommended used-car vehicles for teens (in a national survey, 83% of respondents bought a used car for their teen, not a new vehicle). <u>Go here for IIHS used-car recommendations</u> based on safety ratings. The vehicles are categorized by year.
